Call to leave a message for your elected officials

All bills have to be out of original committee by Friday, Feb 3.

Priority Message of the Week (If you can only do one thing, do this!)

Contact your representatives and ask them to support and vote for HB 2392 - Modifying the Family and Medical Leave Act. We need to have it passed and in law BEFORE the federal rule changes are made.

This bill would re-institute a state law on family leave to insure our state can maintain a strong benefit, even if the federal administration follows through with their proposed rule changes that would make utilizing this unpaid leave benefit much more difficult. The bill also expands the number of employers covered by applying it to those who employ 25 or more (the current law covers only those with 50 or more employees). In addition, the bill extends the right to take unpaid family leave to domestic partners.

Health Care

Establishing minimum labor standards for certain large employers as related to health care services expenditures (FAIR SHARE) – HB 2517 & SB 6356 SUPPORT

This bill would require that large employers (with 5000 or more employees) either provide adequate health insurance to their employees OR pay into a fund that would expand access to the state's Basic Health Plan

Status: HB 2517 is in the House Commerce & Labor Committee. Executive session is scheduled for today (January 26)

SB 6356 is in the Senate Labor, Commerce, Research & Development Committee. A public hearing was held on Jan 19. Bill is eligible for executive session

Action: Leave a message for your Representative and ask them to vote YES on HB 2517.

Also leave a message for the Senate Labor, Commerce, Research & Development Committee asking them to support and a pass SB 6356 out of committee.

Granting the insurance commissioner the authority to review and approve individual health benefit plan rates – HB 2499 & SB 6233 SUPPORT

This bill is part of the "Fair Share" package of health insurance bills. It would give the Insurance Commissioner the authority to review and approve individual health benefit plan rates.

Status: HB 2499 is in the House Health Care Committee. Bill is scheduled for an executive session on Friday Jan 27.

SB 6233 is in the Senate Health & Long-Term Care Committee and is scheduled for a public hearing on Monday, January 30..

Action: Call and leave a message for the House Care Health Committee and let them know you support HB 2499

Requiring health carriers to report certain information – HB 2500 & SB 6232 SUPPORT

This bill is part of the “Fair Share” package of health insurance bills. It requires that each health care coverage provider provide data annually to the insurance commissioner for 5 categories of recipients (total, individual contracts, small group contracts, large group contracts, & government contracts). The insurance commissioner on a searchable web site will then make this data available to the public.

Status: HB 2500 is in the House Health Care Committee. Bill is scheduled for an executive session on Friday, January 27.

SB 6232 has passed out of the Senate Health & Long Term Care Committee. SB 6232 is now in the Rules Committee and is eligible to be passes to the floor of the Senate for passage.

Action: Call and leave a message for the House Health Care Committee and let them know that you support HB 2500.

Call and leave a message for your Senator and let them know that you support SB 6232

Requiring surveys of health professions work force supply and demographics. – SB 6193 SUPPORT

This bill is based on recommendations from the Joint Select Committee on Health Disparities established by the 2004 legislature, which looked at disparate health impacts on persons of color, and to a lesser extent on women. The committee identified a need to develop a workforce that is representative of the diversity of our state's population. In order to accomplish this relevant and accurate data on health care professionals, students in health care professions, and recipients of health care services must first be collected. This bill requires a voluntary, confidential survey of health care providers and students enrolled in training programs to collect at a minimum data related to age, gender, race, ethnicity, area of practice, zip code of practice location, years in practice, and type of facility where a provider practices.

Status: SB 6193 has passed out of the Senate Health & Long Term Care Committee and is now in the Senate Ways & Means Committee. It is scheduled for a public hearing on Tuesday, January 31.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Ways & Means Committee and ask them to pass SB 6193 out of committee.

Requiring multicultural education for health professions – SB 6194 SUPPORT

This bill was also based on recommendations from the Joint Select Committee on Health Disparities. A multicultural health course would be required as part of basic education preparation for programs with a curriculum for training health professionals. Training in multi-cultural health would be included as part of continuing education programs required for health professionals.

Status: SB 6194 has passed out of the Senate Health & Long Term Care Committee. It is now scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Ways & Means Committee.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Ways & Means Committee and ask them to pass SB 6194 out of committee.

Requiring health impact assessments – SB 6195 SUPPORT

This bill was also based on recommendations from the Joint Select Committee on Health Disparities. This bill requires a systematic review a legislative or budgetary proposal or other public policy, program, or practice to determine the extent to which such proposal, policy, program, or practice improves or exacerbates health disparities. Such an assessment can be initiated by any member of the legislature or a member of Governor's Interagency Council on Health Disparities

Status: SB 6195 is scheduled for an executive session today (January 26) in the Senate Health & Long Term Care Committee.

Action: Call and leave a message for your Senators and let them know you support SB 6195.

Creating the governor's interagency council on health disparities – SB 6197 SUPPORT

This bill is related to SB 6195 and creates the Governor's Interagency Council on Health Disparities. The Council must design an action plan to eliminate health disparities in Washington State by 2012 and present progress reports to the Legislature every two years beginning on January 15, 2008, until completion of the plan in 2012.

Status: SB 6197 is scheduled for an executive session today (January 26) in the Senate Health & Long Term Care Committee.

Action: Call and leave a message for your Senators and let them know you support SB 6197.

Modifying basic health plan preexisting condition limitation requirements - HB 2455 MONITOR

If the Basic Health Care Plan rules include a pre-existing condition limitation, the rule must allow the enrollee to credit a period of continued participation in a community based program established to provide care for uninsured individuals.

Status: HB 2455 is in the House Health Care Committee and is scheduled for an executive session on Friday, January 27.

Action:

Regulating Body Piercing – HB 2335 MONITOR

This bill requires the Secretary of Health to establish sterilization and disease prevention standards for body art and body piercing procedures.

Status: SHB 2335 has passed out of the House Health Care Committee and is in the Rules Committee and is eligible for a vote by the House.

Action:

Reproductive Rights

Insuring victims of crimes – HB2481 SUPPORT

HB 2481 is designed to try to protect businesses, such as the Olympia women's clinic, from being unable to acquire reasonably priced liability insurance because they have been victimized by a crime, such as arson.

Status: HB 2481 was scheduled for an executive hearing today (January 26).

Action: Call and leave a message for your Representatives and let them know you support HB 2481

Equal Protection Under the Law

Expand the jurisdiction of the state Human Rights Commission to cover lesbians, gays, bi-sexuals and transgender individuals – HB 2661

This bill would expand the jurisdiction the state Human Rights Commission to include discrimination due to an individual's sexual orientation.

Status: HB 2661 has passed the house and has been placed on third reading and is eligible for a vote by the full senate

Action: Call, email or write your own Senator and ask them to vote yes on HB 2661!

Revising the privilege for sexual assault advocates - HB 2454 & SB 6479 SUPPORT

HB 2454 will clarify that the privileged communication between a sexual assault victim and her sexual assault program advocate is protected when the advocate is communicating with the victim NOT just when the victim is communicating to the advocate

Status: HB 2454 passed out of the House Judiciary Committee on January 25.
SB 6479 was heard in the Senate Judiciary Committee and is eligible for an executive session.

Action: Call and leave a message for your Representatives to ask that they vote in favor of HB 2454.
Call and leave a message for the Senate Judiciary Committee to ask that they vote in favor of SB 6479.

Extending retirement benefits to domestic partners – SB 6218 SUPPORT

This bill extends retirement benefits to domestic partners of the judiciary in Washington State.

Status: SB 6218 is in the Senate Ways and Means Committee & is scheduled for a public hearing on Monday, January 30.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Ways & Means Committee and let them know that you support SB 6218.

Creating sexual assault protection orders – HB 2576 & SB 6478 SUPPORT

This bill allows for a sexual assault protection order to be filed by a victim of sexual assault or on behalf of a minor child, vulnerable adult or any other adult who because of age, disability or health or inaccessibility cannot file for his or her own protection order. This would create a useable protection order for victims of stranger rape and would not require that the individual have been prosecuted.

Status: HB 2576 is scheduled for an executive session on Friday January 27 in the House Judiciary Committee.
SB 6478 was heard in the Senate Judiciary Committee on January 17. The bill is scheduled for an executive session next week.

Action: Call and leave a message for your 2 Representatives ask that they vote YES on HB 2576.
Call and leave a message for the Senate Judiciary Committee and ask that they vote YES on SB 6478.

Urging adoption of a treaty fighting discrimination against women. – HJM 4034 SUPPORT

This bill requests that President Bush and the Secretary of State place the United Nations “*Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women*” in the highest category of priority in order to accelerate the treaty's ratification by the Senate. It also urges the US Senate Foreign Relations Committee to pass this treaty favorably out of Committee and by the full Senate.

Status: HJM 4034 is in the House Judiciary Committee and had a public hearing on Wednesday, January 25. Bill is eligible for an executive session.

Action: Call and leave a message for the House Judiciary Committee and let them know that you support HJM 4034

Prohibiting sellers of travel from promoting travel for sex tourism.– SB 6731 SUPPORT

This bill establishes the crime of promoting travel for prostitution if the person knowingly sells or offers to sell travel services for sex tourism.

Status: SB 6731 is in the Senate Labor, Commerce, Research & Development Committee and is scheduled for a public hearing on Monday, January 30.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Labor, Commerce, Research & Development Committee and let them know that you support SB 6731.

Economic Equity

Modifying the Family and Medical Leave - SB 6185 & HB 2392 SUPPORT

This bill would re-institute a state law on family leave to insure our state can maintain a strong benefit, even if the federal administration follows through with their proposed rule changes that would make utilizing this unpaid leave benefit much more difficult. The bill also expands the number of employers covered by applying it to those who employ 25 or more (the current law covers only those with 50 or more employees). In addition, the bill extends the right to take unpaid family leave to domestic partners.

Status: SB 6185 was heard in the Senate Labor, Commerce, Research, & Development Committee on Thursday January 12. It is expected to have an executive session and be voted out of committee this week.

HB 2392 is scheduled for an executive session on Thursday, Jan 26 in the House Commerce & Labor Committee.

Action: Leave a message for your representatives and ask them to support and vote for HB 2392 Modifying the Family and Medical Leave Act. We need to have it passed and in law BEFORE the federal rule changes are made.

Requiring Living Wages on Public Contracts – HB 1527 SUPPORT

This bill requires state contractors and subcontractors to pay their employees a living wage rate. It specifies that the living wage rate is \$10 per hour if health benefits are provided, or \$11.50 per hour if health benefits are not provided. It also requires that the living wage rate be adjusted annually for inflation.

Status: A Public Hearing in the House Commerce & Labor Committee was held on Wednesday, January 11. The bill is now eligible for an executive session.

Action: Contact your member on the House Commerce and Labor Committee and ask them to support and vote HB 1527 out of committee.

Providing Collective Bargaining for Family Child Care Providers – HB 2353 and SB 6165 SUPPORT

Declares that the purpose of this act is to improve access to and the quality of family childcare services. It also declares that in order to ensure that children receive the highest quality services from these providers, it is necessary to achieve and maintain a stable, well-trained work force. To accomplish these goals, this bill would allow family childcare providers and licensees to have a voice in the development of childcare assistance and other programs through collective bargaining.

Status: HB 2353 is scheduled for an executive session today (January 26) in the House Commerce & Labor Committee.

SB 6165 had a public hearing in the Senate Human Services & Corrections Committee on Jan 23. Bill is eligible for an executive session.

Action: Call and leave a message for your Representatives tell them that you support passage of HB 2353.

Call and leave a message for the Senate Human Services & Corrections Committee and tell them you support SB 6165.

Establishes the Department of Early Learning – HB 2964 and SB 6466 SUPPORT

This bill consolidates all Early Learning Programs in the state of Washington into one Department. The Department's primary duties are to implement early learning policy, to coordinate, consolidate, and integrate child-care and early learning programs to promote an efficient use of funds, and to collaborate with the K-12 school system to improve transitions from pre-kindergarten environments to kindergarten.

Status: HB 2964 passed out of the House Children & Family Services Committee on January 25 and is now in the House Appropriations Committee.

SB 6466 has passed out of the Early Learning, K-12 & Higher Education Committee and has been referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

Action: Call and leave a message for the House Appropriations Committee and the Senate Ways and Means Committee and tell them that you support the Establishment of the Department of Early Learning.

Establishing work groups to periodically review and update the child support schedule – HB 2462 SUPPORT with some concerns

This bill requires that every four years starting in 2008 that the Joint Legislative Audit & Review Committee or other committee designated by the legislature shall review and report on the child support schedule. The bill also requires that the Division of Child Support convene a work group to examine current laws, administrative rules, & practices regarding child support.

NOW supports the every four-year review but has some concerns with the 2nd part of the bill as it goes much further than the federal requirement for the review of the schedule itself.

Status: HB 2462 has passed out of the House Juvenile Justice & Family Law Committee and is now in the House Appropriations Committee.

Action: Call and leave a message for the House Appropriations Committee and let them know that you support the review of the child support schedule every 4 years as required in HB 2462 but that you also have concerns about the other requirements of the bill.

Expanding parenting provisions in the WorkFirst program – SB 6224 SUPPORT

This bill declares that work activity for the state's WorkFirst program shall include satisfactory participation in instruction or training which has the purpose of improving parenting skills or child well being.

Status: This bill is in the Senate Human Services & Corrections Committee and is eligible for a public hearing.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Human Services & Corrections Committee and let them know you support SB 6224

Providing campaign contribution limits for candidates for judicial office – SB 6226 SUPPORT

This bill sets contribution limitations for candidates for judicial office. Currently the state has no contribution limitation for any candidate running for a judicial office including the state's Supreme Court.

Status: SB 6226 is in the Senate Government Operations & Elections Committee and had a public hearing on January 23. Bill is eligible for an executive session.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Government Operations & Elections Committee and let them know that you support SB 6226.

Family Law

Encouraging shared parental responsibility in child custody arrangements – SB 6270 OPPOSE

This bill encourages shared parental responsibility in child custody arrangements. It would create a presumption that shared parenting was in the best interest of the child, change factors that are currently weighted regarding historical care taking roles and set aside state dollars to create pilots.

Status: SB 6270 is currently in the Senate Human Services & Corrections Committee. It is scheduled for a public hearing on Thursday, January 26.

Action: Call and leave a message for the Senate Human Services and Corrections Committee and tell them to vote NO on SB 6270.

Concerning visitation rights for grandparents – HB 2711 - CONCERNS

This bill creates an avenue for grandparents to seek visitation rights.

The state and national courts have been clear that the reasons for over ruling a parents rights in granting visitation to a third party must be based on compelling reasons (such as the person having acted in parental capacity and harm to the child if visitation is not granted) NOT just a particular legal relationship, such as grandparents

Status: HB 2711 is currently in the House Juvenile Justice & Family Law Committee. It is scheduled for a public hearing on Friday, January 27.

Action: Call and leave a message for the House Juvenile Justice & Family Law Committee and let them know that 2711 should be amended to provide avenues for all persons who can meet the Supreme Court standards to seek visitation (including same sex partners!)
